Piloting Localization of Pooled Funds via Coalition Models in Adamawa State of Nigeria

(CBPF-NGA-23-S-NGO-27137)

Grassroots Life Saving Outreach (LESGO) in partnership with The Share Trust, funded by the Nigerian Humanitarian Fund (NHF) under the supervision of United Nations Office for Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UN-OCHA) implemented a 12-month coordination project in Adamawa State - Piloting Localization of Pooled Funds via Coalition Models in Adamawa State. The project pioneered and seamlessly integrated the Local Coalition Accelerator model, fostering enhanced capabilities among National NGOs.

This initiative focused on bolstering the proficiency of National NGOs in knowledge acquisition to bolster resource mobilization, drive effective project implementation, conduct impactful research, shape policies, foster robust collaboration, and facilitate seamless coordination with sectors, agencies, and government MDAs. This project served as a guiding beacon, ensuring standardized, high-quality services and preemptive policies to mitigate various risks, encompassing security, financial, and humanitarian concerns. Moreover, a specific portion of the funding was earmarked for prompt responses to critical crises in health, WaSH, Shelter and Food security, addressing emergent needs effectively.

On this intervention, LESGO led a Coalition of 9 organizations and collaborated with The Share Trust (a US-based organization) to identify another 9 set of nascent organization to benefit from structured capacity building exercise. The project has strengthened the capacities of 18 NNGOs through various thematic capacity strengthening trainings; ranging from board leadership, management, as well as trainings for members of the major operational units of a National NGO including. This was achieved via multiple contact peer learning sessions among operational staff of all 18 participating organization.



Peer learning sessions were conducted for major operational units including the Programs, MEAL, Human Resources, Procurement & Logistics, and Finance units.

The project also provided the platform to co-create and design intervention with community stakeholders and members of the coalition, thereby entrenching localization, through the Joint Crisis Strategy (JCS) developed earlier in the year as a preparedness mechanism to respond to emergencies at the community level.

The JCS was jointly implemented by all member organizations of the coalition and targeted communities of Michika, Mubi North, Hong, and Gombi LGAs in Adamawa State. Response activities implemented via the JCS includes; provision of mobile health services to over 10, 000 community nmembers, distribution of food items to 90 households, distribution of farm inputs to 500 beneficiaries, distribution of hygiene kits to 450 beneficiaries, distribution of dignity kit to 450 beneficiaries, construction of two buildings for 2 households.





Provision of Lean Season Essential Community Health Services for Prevention of Disease Outbreaks, SRH, and WASH in Selected Communities of Yola South and Madagali LGAs.

RESERVE ALLOCATION

(CBPF-NGA-24-R-NGO-32742)

In partnership with the Nigerian Humanitarian Fund (NHF) and under the supervision of the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UN-OCHA), the Grassroot Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) successfully completed a six-month health and WaSH intervention in Madagali and Yola South LGAs, Adamawa State.

This initiative aimed to address critical health and water, sanitation, and hygiene (WaSH) needs in vulnerable communities, particularly during the rainy season, which amplifies risks of disease outbreaks, food insecurity, and malnutrition.

Key Achievements

WaSH Sector (Madagali LGA)

Improved Water Access: Rehabilitated 40 non-functional hand pump boreholes, constructed 10 solarized boreholes, and upgraded 10 existing handpump boreholes, ensuring access to clean drinking water for 18,000 individuals (approximately 3,600 households).

Sanitation and Hygiene: Implemented excreta and solid waste management, including canal cleaning, and conducted hygiene promotion targeting 30,000 people through direct and motorized campaigns.

Disease Prevention: Promoted hygiene practices to households affected by Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM), Acute Watery Diarrhea (AWD), and cholera.

Health Sector (Madagali and Yola South LGAs)

Mobile Medical Response: Deployed four Mobile Medical Teams (MMTs) and two Risk Communication and Community Engagement (RCCE) teams per LGA to provide consultations and interventions for 29,226 individuals, focusing on childhood illnesses, SAM/MAM cases, cholera, malaria, and safe childbirth.

Support for Health Facilities: Enhanced six health facilities with resources such as staff, medical supplies, and training, ensuring effective care delivery and referrals for complicated cases.

Reproductive Health Services: Prioritized antenatal care (ANC), postnatal care (PNC), and Labor and Delivery (L&D) services, including the distribution of delivery kits to reduce maternal and infant mortality.

Community Awareness: Conducted RCCE activities and motorized campaigns to raise awareness about diseases, Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV), and Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH).

Impact

This project significantly improved access to essential health and WaSH services, reduced the risk of disease outbreaks, and enhanced community resilience in the face of rainy-season challenges. By addressing both immediate needs and long-term sustainability, the intervention contributed to safeguarding lives and fostering healthier, more resilient communities.

Looking Ahead

The successful completion of this project highlights our commitment to responding proactively to humanitarian crises and supporting the most vulnerable populations. Moving forward, we remain dedicated to expanding our impact and ensuring that every community we serve has access to critical health and WaSH services.





Chart Showing PWDs Beneficiaries Reached in Madagali

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Providing Emergency MPCA, WASH, and Protection Assistance for Flood-Affected Populations in Madagali LGA.

In 2024, severe flooding in Adamawa State, exacerbated by dam spillage and heavy rains, devastated Madagali LGA, displacing over 1,900 households, destroying infrastructure, and disrupting livelihoods.

To address these challenges, LESGO, in partnership with UN-IOM under the Rapid Response Fund, implemented a three-month intervention focused on providing Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA), WASH, and protection services.

Key activities included:

- Delivering MPCA to 1,912 households.
- Upgrading 7 water schemes to solarized boreholes and rehabilitating 3 handpump boreholes.
- Training WASHCOM and hygiene promoters for hygiene education and water chlorination.
- Distributing 500 dignity kits, 700 hygiene kits, and installing 33 halogen lights for safety at water points.
- Conducting sensitization on GBV, PSEAH, and VAWG and strengthening protection service referral pathways.

This intervention underscores the importance of timely support to mitigate the impact of natural disasters and restore the dignity and resilience of affected communities.

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Provision of coordinated emergency health and WASH response for flood affected populations in Yola South and Lamurde LGAs. CBPF-NGA-24-R-NGO-33847

The Reserve Allocation 3 (RA3) project, launched on October 18, 2024, is a comprehensive health intervention designed to improve access to quality healthcare and address disease outbreaks in underserved and flood-affected communities in Adamawa State. This initiative been implemented in collaboration with the Civil Society Coalition for Poverty Eradication - CISCOPE (handling the WaSH aspect of the project) aims to strengthen healthcare systems, enhance disease prevention efforts, and foster community resilience.

Key Milestones and Activities

The project began with advocacy visits to government entities and stakeholder sensitization workshops to ensure alignment with local needs and foster collaboration.

A training program for 50 healthcare workers equipped them with skills in managing childhood illnesses, sexual and reproductive health (SRH), malnutrition, and common diseases such as malaria and cholera.

This project delivered critical healthcare services to underserved and displaced populations.

Mobile health teams provided life-saving care, addressing illnesses like diarrhea, malaria, respiratory infections, and skin conditions. Maternal and child health services, including antenatal/postnatal care and immunizations, were prioritized to reduce mortality, alongside the distribution of essential medicines and equipment to health facilities.

Preventive measures included mass distribution of mosquito nets to combat malaria, active cholera case surveillance, and referrals for malnourished children with SAM and MAM. Community engagement was strengthened through health education, disease monitoring, and collaboration with local leaders to ensure culturally sensitive interventions.

As a result, the project improved healthcare access, enhanced disease surveillance, and empowered communities, laying a foundation for long-term health improvements while advancing our commitment to equitable healthcare and resilient communities.




Chart Showing PWDs Beneficiaries Reached in Lamurde





Chart Showing NPWDs Beneficiaries Reached in Yola South

CHOLERA RESPONSE

In 2024, LESGO demonstrated a strong commitment to public health by responding swiftly and decisively to a cholera outbreak in Adamawa State. Understanding the urgency of the situation, we mobilized resources and collaborated with local health authorities, WHO, and community leaders to deliver a comprehensive response.

Our efforts included, a quick deployment of our mobile health team to attend to the affected populations, a fast response fumigation exercise in Yola South, the donation of essential medical supplies such as Ringer's Lactate, antibiotics, Oral Rehydration Salts (ORS), cholera rapid diagnostic kits, and sanitation materials, including soap and hand sanitizers. These items were distributed strategically to ensure those most affected by the outbreak received immediate care. Our medical team worked tirelessly to facilitate the distribution and provide technical support to local healthcare workers.

In addition to medical assistance, we launched extensive community sensitization campaigns to prevent further spread of the disease.

Our team conducted on-site education sessions, teaching residents about cholera symptoms, preventive measures, and the importance of seeking early treatment.

Recognizing the importance of reaching remote areas, we also partnered with local radio stations to broadcast critical health information, ensuring that even the most marginalized communities were informed.

This dual approach—addressing immediate health needs while building awareness for prevention—was a testament to LESGO's holistic strategy for combating public health crises. Our efforts not only saved lives but also empowered communities with the knowledge and tools to protect themselves against future outbreaks.



Supporting Public Health Response through EOC Meetings

In 2024, LESGO continued to play a vital role in supporting the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) meetings held at the Specialist Hospital in Yola, Nigeria. These critical meetings are convened in response to public health emergencies, bringing together key stakeholders to strategize and implement life-saving interventions.

Our support for these meetings has been multifaceted, ensuring that operations run smoothly and effectively. We have consistently provided refreshments for participants and supplied fuel for the hospital's generator to guarantee uninterrupted power during deliberations. These contributions have created a conducive environment for effective decision-making, even during challenging circumstances.

In addition, LESGO as part of its commitment to making quality healthcare accessible, donated essential medicines during outbreaks to help mitigate the impact of diseases on affected populations. This collaborative effort has strengthened the EOC's ability to respond promptly and effectively to public health crises, safeguarding the well-being of the communities we serve.

Our commitment to supporting the EOC underscores our dedication to improving health outcomes and reinforcing the capacity of local systems to address emergencies with resilience and efficiency.









Participation in the Joint Operational Review of Humanitarian Health Emergency Program

In 2024, the Grassroot Life saving outreach (LESGO) proudly participated in the Joint Operational Review of the Humanitarian Health Emergency Program, hosted by the World Health Organization (WHO) at the Muhammadu Indimi Learning Centre in Borno State, Nigeria.



The review focused on the health interventions carried out in Borno, Adamawa, Yobe, Plateau, and Benue States, bringing together stakeholders from various sectors to evaluate progress, share experiences, and strategize for future improvements.

This high-level gathering provided an opportunity to:

- Assess Program Progress: Review the achievements, challenges, and lessons learned from ongoing humanitarian health interventions across the target states.
- Foster Collaboration: Strengthen partnerships among humanitarian organizations, government agencies, and local actors to ensure a coordinated and effective response.

Strategize for Impact: Develop actionable plans to address emerging health challenges and improve the delivery of essential healthcare services to vulnerable populations.

Our organization contributed to the discussions, offering insights and recommendations based on our experience in health service delivery and emergency response. The review emphasized the importance of building resilient health systems, enhancing local capacity, and ensuring equitable access to healthcare, particularly for displaced and underserved communities.

By participating in this review, we reaffirm our commitment to supporting initiatives that strengthen the health sector and improve the quality of life for people in affected regions. Together with other stakeholders, we are dedicated to building resilient communities and ensuring that everyone has access to the healthcare they need. This collaboration is a vital step toward achieving sustainable health outcomes and fostering a future where no one is left behind.

1 GDAYS OF ACTIVISM

As part of the global 16 Days of Activism campaign Against Gender-Based Violence (GBV), LESGO hosted a two-day event focused on empowering young girls aged 13–18yrs in grassroots communities. The initiative aimed to raise awareness about GBV, educate participants on its types, causes, and consequences, and equip them with practical tools to recognize and address GBV. The event also connected the girls with local support systems to ensure survivors have access to necessary resources.

The activities included sensitization sessions that featured detailed presentations on GBV, group discussions, and role-playing exercises to highlight proactive responses. Participants also engaged in creative workshops where they designed posters and placards to express their understanding of GBV and promote resilience. Through these activities, the initiative helped the girls gain confidence, build advocacy skills, and develop a sense of empowerment.

In addition to educating the girls, the event fostered community-level action by strengthening the connections between participants and local support services. The overall goal was to create safer, more supportive environments in grassroots communities while promoting respect, equality, and the elimination of GBV.

World Humanitarian Day 2024

On August 19, 2024, the Grassroots Life Saving Outreach (LESGO), joined global and national stakeholders in commemorating World Humanitarian Day (WHD) in Yola, Adamawa State, Nigeria. The theme for WHD 2024 emphasized the urgent need to protect civilians and humanitarian workers in conflict zones, aligning with our mission to support vulnerable communities.

The event brought together senior officials from the Federal and State Government of Nigeria, the United Nations, humanitarian partners, and internally displaced persons (IDPs) to honor the dedication of aid workers and advocate for their safety. The Adamawa State Governor, represented by Deputy Governor Professor (Mrs) Kaletapwa Farauta, underscored the importance of continued support toward durable solutions for displaced people.

As part of the event's activities, the United Nations Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator, Mohamed M. Fall, led a high-level visit to a stabilization center treating severely malnourished children. The center, operated by the Yola State Government with support from the International Rescue Committee, UNICEF, and WHO, exemplifies the collaborative efforts essential in addressing humanitarian crises.

World Humanitarian Day 2024 served as a poignant reminder of the sacrifices made by aid workers and the ongoing challenges in delivering humanitarian assistance. LESGO remains dedicated to its mission of building communities where people have access to quality healthcare and basic services, honoring the dignity of mankind, and ensuring that life is worth living and living well.









HUMANITARIAN

PROGRAM CYCLE

We were actively involved in the 2025 Humanitarian Program Cycle (HPC) workshop, held at the American University of Nigeria – AUN, Yola. This pivotal two-day event served as a cornerstone for planning humanitarian responses for the coming year. The workshop focused on validating data collection exercises and strategically setting the course for humanitarian interventions in 2025. LESGO's representative, Mr. Michael Sanni, played a significant role as part of the Health Sector's cluster activities during the workshop. As a dedicated advocate for improved health outcomes, Mr. Sanni contributed to discussions on integrating health priorities into the broader humanitarian action plan for 2025.

Key Highlights of the Engagement:

Understanding the immense sacrifices made by military personnel in protecting lives, maintaining peace, and ensuring national security, we launched an initiative focused on their health and safety.

Recognizing that malaria remains a significant health threat in many of the environments where our soldiers operate, LESGO donated treated mosquito nets to military personnel stationed in high-risk areas. This initiative was not just about providing a preventive health tool; it was a gesture of gratitude, acknowledging the resilience, courage, and dedication of those who serve on the front lines.

The treated mosquito nets serve as a critical line of defense against mosquito-borne diseases, particularly malaria, which poses a constant threat to soldiers due to prolonged exposure in endemic regions. By distributing these nets, LESGO aimed to reduce the incidence of malaria, thereby enhancing the overall health, operational readiness, and morale of our troops.

Lifesaving Intervention for 7 Year old Fatima

During one of our 2024 outreaches in Saminaka, Yola South LGA of Adamawa state, our team met Fatima, a 7-year-old suffering from severe body swelling. Her family couldn't afford the diagnostic tests recommended by doctors, leaving them to rely on home remedies.

Recognizing the urgency, our team documented her case and, with support from our program Manager, Mr. James Siggi, funds was secured for her tests and treatment.

Fatima was admitted to Modibbo Adama University Teaching Hospital, Yola, where she received essential care. Her condition has improved, and she's on track for a full recovery, with follow-up care scheduled to monitor her progress.

Musa's Journey to Recovery

In Lakare, another hard-to-reach settlement, six-year-old Musa Mohammed was brought in for an outpatient consultation. His mother explained he suffered from recurrent fevers and scrotal swelling. The LESGO team suspected a hydrocele requiring surgery.

Musa's mother explained the condition had been previously diagnosed, but they couldn't afford the surgery. His father, Mr. Mohammed, said, "I feel for my son anytime the swelling increases; he hardly sleeps because of pain. I had planned to take him for surgery after the harvest, but my farm didn't yield enough even to feed us, let alone pay for the operation."

LESGO covered the medical expenses, enabling Musa to undergo successful surgery at Adamawa State Specialist Hospital. His parents expressed deep gratitude to LESGO and NHF for the intervention.





Transforming Lives: Elijah Emmanuel's Story of Hope

In 2024, LESGO continued its mission to provide life-saving healthcare services to underserved communities. One remarkable story is that of three-year-old Elijah Emmanuel from Shemun, Opalo ward in Lamurde LGA, whose journey exemplifies the impact of our work.

Elijah suffered from an umbilical hernia, a condition identified during an outreach by the LESGO mobile team. Following the examination, his mother, Mrs. Emmanuel, was referred to Gyawana PHCC for further consultation. There, he was diagnosed with both an umbilical hernia and hydrocele, conditions requiring urgent surgery. However, due to financial constraints, his parents were unable to proceed with the recommended treatment.

Understanding the urgency of the situation, LESGO stepped in, covering the entire cost of Elijah's surgery and medical care. On November 27, 2024, he was admitted for surgery at Numan General Hospital, successfully operated on the following day, and safely discharged on December 12, 2024. This intervention not only restored Elijah's health but also provided his family with renewed hope for the future.

Beyond individual cases, LESGO's Risk Communication and Community Engagement (RCCE) and mobile teams have extended their reach to 63 settlements in Lamurde LGA.

Their work includes health education, drug distribution, and the provision of long-lasting insecticidal nets (LLINs). Additionally, local facilities have facilitated skilled birth attendance and distributed Mama Kits across multiple wards. Cases of severe acute malnutrition (SAM) and moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) have also been promptly addressed through facility referrals.

Elijah's story highlights LESGO's commitment to ensuring that no one is left behind, reaffirming our dedication to health equity and community well-being.



Bringing Safe Motherhood to Bole: Samira's Story

Bole, a remote settlement in Yola South, is predominantly home to the Vere tribe. On December 19, 2024, LESGO's mobile health team made its first visit to the community, gaining access through local leaders who provided a shaded area for the mobile clinic. As residents gathered, the team conducted a health sensitization session, educating them on disease prevention, hygiene, immunization, and reproductive health. Key topics included antenatal care (ANC), postnatal care (PNC), skilled birth attendance, and family planning.

During the session, a distressed Mallam Adamu approached the team and admitted, "Madam, as you were speaking about ANC and hospital deliveries, I felt guilty. My wife has been in labor since yesterday, and I left her in the hands of two elderly women known for assisting with childbirth.

"The LESGO team immediately went to his house, where they found Samira in excruciating pain, attended by two traditional birth attendants (TBAs) who scolded her for crying. The TBAs had given her hot water, believing it would hasten the birth. A quick assessment by the LESGO nurse revealed that Samira was 8 cm dilated—too far along for safe transfer to a health facility. Recognizing the urgency, the nurse performed an artificial rupture of membranes (ARM) to aid labor progression. Within 1 hour and 15 minutes, Samira safely delivered a healthy baby boy.

The LESGO nurse safely delivered Samira's baby, provided postpartum care, and administered medication to prevent complications. Samira received a Mama Kit and, overwhelmed with gratitude, shared her struggles with poverty.

During a follow-up, she admitted she had never accessed antenatal care (ANC) or immunized her children, leading to past infant losses. The LESGO team educated her on maternal and child health. Upon revisiting Bole, both mother and baby were thriving, and her husband had become more engaged in their healthcare.

This story underscores LESGO's impact in remote communities, saving lives, empowering families, and promoting better health for vulnerable populations.
