Our Reach and Impact at a Glance

Since the commencement of NHF First Reserve Allocation in July 2024, with the support of Health and WaSH sector in Yola South and Madagali LGAs, LESGO RCCE and Mobile Medical Team have been able to cover **15** wards and **34** settlements across the two LGAs. Our RCCE team have been able to sensitized **8,616** Women; **6,217** Men; **5,371** Girls, **4,532** Boys and **472** Persons with Disabilities.

In continuation of our achievements, the Mobile Medical Team outreaches and facility based team have strategically provide medical services at both community and facility level to **4,129** Women; **2,040** Men; **2,595** Girls, **2,164** Boys and **349** Persons with Disabilities totaling to **36,492** people reached.

LESGO Donates Drugs and Other Medical supplies To Help Tackle the Recent Cholera Outbreak in Adamawa.

In response to the recent cholera outbreak in parts of Adamawa State, LESGO has taken swift and decisive action to help the affected communities.

Understanding the urgency of the situation, our team immediately mobilized resources to address both the healthcare and awareness needs of the local population. One of our key efforts was the prompt delivery of essential drugs and medical supplies to ensure that those affected receive the necessary treatment and care. Our medical team worked closely with local health authorities, WHO and community leaders to distribute these vital supplies and ensure that they reach the people who need them the most.

Some of the items donated by LESGO includes:

- · 22 cartons of Ringers Lacted
- 1 carton of Multi-purpose soap
- 20 cartons of detergent
- 2 cartons of hand sanitizers
- 1 bag of cotton wool
- 1 pack of facemask
- 1 carton of Melt elated spirit
- 4 packs of Cannulas
- 5 packs of Azithromycin Tabs
- 1 carton of Doxycycline Tabs
- 1 carton of ORS
- 100 liters of PMS Fuel
- 20 Packs of Cholera RDT Kits

Alongside medical support, we recognized the importance of raising awareness to prevent further spread of the outbreak. Our team conducted onsite sensitization sessions in the affected areas, educating residents about preventive measures, symptoms to watch for, and the importance of early treatment. This grassroots approach was reinforced with a broader outreach through local radio stations, where we shared critical information to reach a wider audience, including those in remote areas. By combining on-the-ground action with a robust communication strategy, we aim to empower the community with the knowledge needed to protect themselves and prevent the situation from worsening.

Follow-Up Visit to Flood Victims at Shuwa and Koppa Community

Following the devastating flood that recently affected parts of Madagali Local Government Area, our outreach team responded by donating essential drugs and relief materials to the victims.

In September, we took a step further by organizing a sensitization visit to the IDP camps at Shuwa Primary School and Kopa Community. This visit aimed to assess the situation on the ground, listen to the victims, and evaluate the impact of our relief efforts. During the visit, our team engaged directly with the displaced persons to hear firsthand about their current challenges and how they have been coping since the flood. This interaction was crucial in understanding the gaps that remain and the areas where further support is needed. The feedback from the community not only helps us measure the effectiveness of the aid we have provided but also guides our future interventions to ensure we are meeting the most pressing needs.

Our work in Madagali LGA continues as we strive to support these vulnerable communities in rebuilding their lives. The flood has had a severe impact on the livelihoods and well-being of those affected, and we remain committed to helping them recover. LESGO's ongoing presence in Madagali highlights our dedication to standing with communities in times of crisis, and we invite others to join us in providing much-needed assistance to those who are still struggling in the aftermath of the disaster.



MEDICAL OUTREACH TO KABAWA WULUM COMMUNITY

The Kabawa Wulum community in Yola South is one of the key areas where we are implementing the "Provision of Lean Season Essential Community Health Services for Prevention of Disease Outbreaks, SRH, and WASH in Selected Communities" project.

As part of our commitment to ensuring the effectiveness of this initiative, our officials visited the community on 11th of September to assess the impact of the project and listen directly to the beneficiaries. During the visit, we engaged with community members to understand how the project has improved their access to essential healthcare services, strengthened disease prevention efforts, and addressed pressing issues related to reproductive health and water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH). The feedback we received has been overwhelmingly positive, highlighting the role of the project in preventing disease outbreaks and improving overall community health and well-being. By connecting directly with the people, we gained valuable insights into how our interventions have not only improved health outcomes but also contributed to a sense of security and dignity within the Kabawa Wulum community.
