Esteemed Partners and Stakeholders,

I am pleased to present the Grassroot Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) 2025 Annual Report, which highlights our collective efforts and humanitarian impact across vulnerable communities in Adamawa State.

In response to flooding, disease outbreaks, and conflict-related vulnerabilities, LESGO delivered integrated health, WASH, and protection interventions through mobile medical outreaches, health facility support, distribution of relief materials, and as well co-pioneered the anticipatory action response with eight other organizations who provided Multipurpose Cash Assistance to the most vulnerable. These interventions improved access to essential services for thousands of women, men, boys, and girls across Yola South, Yola North, Mubi North, Lamurde, Girei, Fufore, and Madagali Local Government Areas.

In 2025, a total of 5 primary healthcare facilities were supported with Life saving drugs and other health commodities, these facilities provided free quality out-patient and sexual reproductive health services to over 11,000 community members. Similarly, our mobile medical health teams reached a total of 17,950 community members with free quality healthcare services, with referrals to the supported facilities. The Risk Communication and Community Engagement Team (RCCE Team) provided hygiene promotion and health talk to a total of 50,516 community members.

In our Anticipatory Action (AA) program, LESGO provided Multipurpose Cash Assistance to 2,180 flood affected population to build their resilience and preparedness towards the anticipated flood. Other achievements in 2025 include; the distribution of 805 Mama Kits, 5,500 insecticide-treated mosquito nets, donation of Life saving drugs and other commodities to Public Health Emergency Operation Center (PHEOC)/Cholera Treatment Center (CTC). LESGO also supported outbreak preparedness and response efforts, and actively contributed to coordination and localization initiatives. In respect to Accountability to Affected Populations (AAP) and Community Feedback Mechanism (CFM), LESGO now operates a toll-free line which enhances anonymous reporting, community complaints and feedback harvesting.

These achievements reflect the dedication of our staff, volunteers, partners, and donors. As we move forward, LESGO remains committed to strengthening resilient health and WASH systems and advancing locally led humanitarian and anticipatory action that leaves no one behind.







Provision of Coordinated Emergency Health And WASH Response For Flood Affected Populations in Yola South And Lamurde LGAs:

The Reserve Allocation 3 (RA3) Project, launched in October 2024, continued implementation into 2025 and was concluded in April, 2025.

During the reporting period, the project strengthened healthcare delivery in underserved and flood-affected communities in Adamawa State, in partnership with the Civil Society Coalition for Poverty Eradication (CISCOPE), which led the WaSH component. Key activities included continued mobile health outreach, delivery of maternal and child health services, disease surveillance, and distribution of essential medicines and supplies to health facilities.

Preventive interventions such as malaria prevention, cholera surveillance, and referrals for malnourished children (SAM and MAM) were sustained, alongside community health education and engagement with local leaders. These efforts contributed to improved access to healthcare services, enhanced disease monitoring, and stronger community resilience.

Chart Showing Beneficiaries Reached in Yola South




Chart Showing PWDs Beneficiaries Reached in Lamurde





Chart Showing Beneficiaries Reached in Lamurde

Provision of Emergency Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA) to flood-affected vulnerable populations in Girei and Fufore LGAs, Adamawa State



Every year, communities in Yola and its surrounding areas experience recurrent flooding, which consistently results in the loss of lives, destruction of farmlands, displacement of households, and significant damage to public and private property. These floods disproportionately affect vulnerable populations, undermining livelihoods and deepening existing humanitarian needs.

In anticipation and preparedness to the 2025 flooding, and as part of our Standard Allocation 1 Project, LESGO in collaboration with The Christian Rural and Urban Development Association of Nigeria (CRUDAN) implemented the Provision of Emergency Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA) for flood-affected vulnerable populations in Girei and Fufore Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Adamawa State. The project was designed to provide timely, flexible, and dignified assistance that allowed affected households to prioritize their most urgent needs in the event of the floods.

Through this intervention, 2,180 targeted flood-affected households in Girei and Fufore LGAs received cash assistance to support access to food, shelter, healthcare, and other essential needs, thereby easing the immediate economic burden caused by the disaster. The use of MPCA enabled beneficiaries to make context-appropriate

Beyond immediate relief, the project placed strong emphasis on risk awareness, preparedness, and community resilience. Community sensitization workshops which focused on flood risk reduction and early response actions were conducted and context-specific Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials was distributed. These sessions equipped community members with practical knowledge on how to prepare for floods, respond safely during flood events, and take appropriate recovery actions afterward, reducing exposure to future risks.

The successful implementation of this project demonstrated our organizational strengths in rapid Anticipatory Actions (AA) and response, community engagement, and integrated humanitarian programming. Our approach combined life-saving assistance with capacity-building, ensuring that affected populations were not only supported in the short term but also better prepared for future flood events. The project further reinforced our strong collaboration with community leaders and local stakeholders, which was critical to effective targeting, acceptance, and accountability throughout implementation.





Chart Showing Beneficiaries Reached in Girei LGA

Emergency Response to the Adamawa Flood Victims

In July of 2025, severe flash flooding struck parts of Yola South Local Government Area, Adamawa State, following prolonged and intense rainfall that caused the overflow of a nearby dam. The floods submerged several communities, including Yolde Parte, Shagari, Sabon Pege, and Modire, resulting in widespread displacement and loss. According to available reports, over 25 lives were lost, 11 persons were reported missing, and more than 5,500 individuals were displaced.

The affected population included families with young children, pregnant and lactating women, older persons, and individuals living with chronic health conditions. Many displaced households were relocated to a temporary shelter at Aliyu Mustapha College, where overcrowding, poor sanitation, and limited access to healthcare heightened the risk of disease outbreaks and further vulnerability.

In response, Grassroots Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) rapidly deployed an emergency medical outreach to provide immediate, life-saving healthcare services to flood-affected populations within the temporary camp.

The intervention focused on addressing urgent health needs, preventing disease outbreaks, and supporting the most vulnerable groups.

During the outreach, 170 individuals received medical treatment, including 19 children aged 0–5 years, 22 adolescents aged 6–17 years, and 129 adults, with women accounting for 125 of those treated. To further reduce the risk of malaria, 200 insecticide-treated mosquito nets were distributed, prioritizing children, pregnant women, and nursing mothers.

A key strength of the response was LESGO's effective collaboration with the Nigerian Air Force (NAF) medical team, which also supported the camp. As the NAF medical team's drug supplies became overstretched due to increasing demand, LESGO provided essential medicines to ensure continuity of care for affected populations. This partnership underscored the importance of coordinated, multi-agency action in emergency response and demonstrated LESGO's capacity to complement government-led efforts during humanitarian crises.

Through this timely intervention, LESGO reinforced its commitment to rapid emergency response, strategic partnerships, and the delivery of dignified, life-saving assistance to vulnerable communities affected by disasters.

LESGO Supports Scabies Outbreak Response with Drug Donation to the EOC

Scabies, a highly contagious skin condition, affected multiple communities across Adamawa State, creating an urgent demand for treatment supplies and effective case management. Grassroots Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) provided critical support to the Adamawa State scabies outbreak response in Yola south through the donation of essential drugs and medical supplies to the Adamawa state Public Health Emergency Operations Centre (PHEOC).

This contribution helped to strengthen the state’s coordinated public health response and enhanced the capacity of frontline health workers to deliver timely treatment and contain the spread of the disease. The drugs donated by LESGO supported the Adamawa State Ministry of Health and response partners to rapidly scale up care for affected individuals, reduce transmission within communities, and mitigate the public health impact of the outbreak.



Commemoration of World Humanitarian Day 2025

World Humanitarian Day usually celebrated 19th August every year, a global observance dedicated to honouring humanitarian workers and reinforcing collective commitment to humanitarian principles and action. The 2025 edition carried the overarching global message of “Act for Humanity”, underscoring the importance of solidarity, protection, and support for people affected by conflict, disasters, and displacement, as well as for the frontline responders who serve them. In Nigeria, the day was marked by a joint communiqué signed by the Federal Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs and Poverty Reduction and the United Nations Humanitarian Coordinator, reaffirming shared commitments to strengthening locally led humanitarian response, enhancing coordination, and upholding humanitarian

Grassroots Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) joined other civil society organisations (CSOs), government agencies, and humanitarian partners in marking World Humanitarian Day (WHD). During the event, a total of 100 Mama kits was donated to UN-OCHA by LESGO which was shared to Pregnant women from the fufore IDP Camp.

The event was part of broader national activities highlighting the urgent needs facing vulnerable populations and the critical role of humanitarian actors in responding to crises.

LESGO’s participation in the event reinforced the organisation’s continued engagement with key stakeholders across government, United Nations agencies, and civil society.





Distribution of Insecticide-Treated Mosquito Nets in Lamurde LGA

In March 2025, Grassroots Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) implemented a community-based intervention aimed at reducing the burden of malaria and other mosquito-borne diseases through the distribution of Long Last Insecticide-treated Nets (LLIN) to vulnerable households in Lamurde Local Government Area, Adamawa State.

The distribution targeted community members most at risk, including children under five, pregnant women, and households with limited access to preventive healthcare services. By providing treated mosquito nets to 5,500 community members, the intervention sought to strengthen household-level disease prevention, promote healthy living practices, and reduce preventable morbidity associated with malaria, which remains a leading public health concern in the region.

In addition to the distribution, beneficiaries received basic sensitization on the proper use and maintenance of mosquito nets, reinforcing positive health-seeking behaviour and maximizing the protective impact of the intervention. The activity contributed to broader community awareness on malaria prevention and environmental hygiene.

This initiative aligns with LESGO's core mandate in Health and Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) programming and reflects the organization's continued commitment to improving community well-being through preventive, community-driven health interventions. Through such targeted actions, LESGO continues to support efforts to reduce the disease burden, protect vulnerable populations, and promote resilient, healthier communities across Adamawa State.





Participation in Quality Cash Coordination Framework (QCCF) Training – Northeast Nigeria

In October 2025, Grassroots Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) strengthened its technical and coordination capacity in Cash and Voucher Assistance (CVA) through active participation in the Quality Cash Coordination Framework (QCCF) Training for the Northeast Region, organized by the Cash Working Group (CWG Nigeria) in collaboration with the International Organization for Migration (IOM) and the Global Cash Advisory Group (CAG).


The workshop focused on enhancing the effectiveness of Cash and Voucher Assistance (CVA) interventions through improved coordination structures, accountability mechanisms, and localization approaches. Sessions included interactive learning, group exercises, case studies, and practical tools aligned with the CWG Transition Plan and the operationalization of the National Cash and Voucher Assistance (NCVA) Policy, aimed at empowering local actors

LESGO participated fully in the 3-day training, contributing field-based insights from its implementation of Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance (MPCA) for flood-affected households in Adamawa State. This engagement enabled knowledge sharing on best practices, challenges, and lessons learned from frontline implementation, while also strengthening the organization's technical capacity in targeting, coordination, accountability to affected populations, monitoring, and risk management in cash programming.

Participation in the QCCF training further reinforced LESGO's commitment to localization, standards-based programming, and collaborative humanitarian action. The knowledge and tools gained will directly inform future cash interventions, ensuring more coordinated, transparent, and efficient delivery of assistance to vulnerable communities.

Through continued engagement in national and regional coordination platforms, LESGO remains dedicated to improving the quality, accountability, and impact of cash-based humanitarian responses in Adamawa State and the broader Northeast region.

Health Sector Humanitarian Strategy and Localization Workshop 2025

In January 2025, Grassroots Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) strengthened its engagement in sector-level coordination and localization efforts through the participation of its Program Manager, Mr. James T. Sigg, in the Health Sector Humanitarian Response Strategy and Localization Plan Workshop for Borno, Adamawa, and Yobe (BAY) States, funded by the European Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations (ECHO).

The workshop, held in Borno State, brought together government institutions, local and international NGOs, and health sector partners to review and advance strategies for locally led health interventions and improved emergency health response in crisis-affected communities. Discussions focused on strengthening coordination, enhancing the role of local actors, and aligning response efforts with evolving humanitarian needs across the BAY States.

LESGO's participation reaffirmed the organization's commitment to localization, collaboration, and evidence-based programming, while also contributing to collective efforts aimed at building a more effective, inclusive, and sustainable health response system for vulnerable populations.



Consultation Workshop & Situational Analysis with Key Stakeholders for the Development of the Climate-Resilient Faecal Sludge Management Strategy and Operative Guideline for Adamawa state.

In November 2025, Grassroots Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO) strengthened its engagement in policy dialogue and systems strengthening through her participation in the Consultation Workshop and Situational Analysis with Key Stakeholders for the Development of the Climate-Resilient Faecal Sludge Management (FSM) Strategy and Operative Guidelines for Adamawa State.

The workshop, hosted by the Adamawa State Government in collaboration with UNICEF and the Government of the Netherlands, convened key government institutions, development partners, and civil society actors to jointly assess existing challenges and define strategic pathways for improving Faecal Sludge Management in the context of climate change. Discussions focused on strengthening WASH systems, reducing public health risks, and promoting sustainable, resilient sanitation solutions across the state.

LESGO's participation contributed practical field-level perspectives to the consultation, reinforcing the importance of community-centered, climate-resilient WASH interventions. Through engagement in such strategic processes, LESGO continues to support evidence-based policy development and collaborative approaches aimed at improving public health outcomes and building safer, more resilient communities in Adamawa State.



Monitoring Visit to Mubi Trauma Centre: Strengthening Emergency Case Management and WASH Response

In December 2025, Grassroots Lifesaving Outreach (LESGO), participated in a Joint Monitoring and Observation visit to the Mubi Trauma Centre, alongside partners from the Adamawa State Ministry of Health and the Health Sector National Coordinator. The visit formed part of ongoing efforts to assess service delivery, identify gaps, and strengthen the effectiveness of the emergency response.

Findings from the visit highlighted significant progress in case management and patient care. The Case Treatment Unit (CTU) has remained fully operational, providing free treatment

services, 24-hour ambulance support, and meals for patients and caregivers. Within the reporting week, 171 suspected cases were managed, with only one recorded mortality, while nine patients remained under active care, reflecting improved response capacity and the dedication of frontline health teams. The visit also confirmed strong momentum in Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) and community-

based response activities. Blanket chlorination of water sources was ongoing, Case Area Targeted Intervention (CATI) teams were actively deployed across affected communities

and sustained community engagement and risk communication efforts continued to deliver prevention messages in identified hotspot areas.

Despite these gains, key challenges were identified, including limited frontline staffing capacity, difficulties managing patients with co-morbidities, and shortages of certain essential medicines and rapid diagnostic tests. Addressing these gaps remains critical to sustaining progress and preventing a resurgence of cases.

The Standard Allocation One (SA1) 2025 funding, which was disbursed in December 2025, recorded a 3.06% expenditure during the reporting period. This expenditure was primarily related to the procurement of project materials in preparation for project implementation. A balance of ₦295,539,173.28, representing 97.10% of the total closing balance, was carried forward to 2026 to support the full implementation of the Standard Allocation One project activities.



2025 LESSONS LEARNT

Some Key lessons learned include:

1. Early, locally led response significantly improves outcomes:

Timely engagement of local actors, community volunteers, and state authorities enabled faster access to affected populations and improved acceptance of interventions. Locally led coordination proved critical in rapidly evolving emergencies and strengthened trust between communities and responders.

2. Community engagement is essential for prevention and behaviour change:

Sustained community sensitization and two-way communication improved early care-seeking behaviour, adherence to preventive measures, and acceptance of interventions such as CATI, chlorination, and mosquito net use.

3. Localization strengthens sustainability and resilience:

Investing in local systems, policy dialogue, and capacity strengthening—particularly in health and WASH—enhanced sustainability and positioned local actors as effective leaders in humanitarian response.
